As its founder and producer, I have the pleasure of warmly welcoming you to LA, Italia. I would like to invite all of you to reflect on the current situation and to contribute in






For its 17th anniversary the festival will again enjoy a special celebration to share the fantasies, the dreams, and the emotions that Italian cinema spreads across the world.

During the G20 summit in Rome, the President of the Italian Republic, Sergio Mattarella, held a bilateral meeting with US President, Joseph R. Biden, during which the two leaders reaffirmed their countries' deeply-rooted friendship. President Biden stressed the importance of diplomatic relationships between Italy and the US several times, and he thanked Mattarella for hosting the G20 summit, where the world's major economies came together to tackle delicate issues such as climate change, the handling of the pandemic, and the nations' plans for economic recovery. A staunch supporter of multilateralism, Biden expressed his country's intention to deepen its relationships with its traditional allies, including Italy. Americans have always been generous to Italians, while continuously showing a deep appreciation for Italian history, culture, and art. In the past several decades, Italian foreign policy has been able to simultaneously preserve the nations status as a European leader, as well as its unwavering loyalty to the US, by establishing a vast network of relationships in the fields of politics, economy, business, science and culture.

President Biden also has personal ties to Italy, as Jill Biden is the first US President's spouse of Italian descent in history. Her family name, Giacoppa, was anglicized into Jacobs by her grandfather Gaetano, who emigrated to America from the Sicilian village of Gesso, near Messina. The First Lady once again declared that the ethics of her Italian forefathers will be the guiding principles of her husband's administration: shared values, sense of belonging, transnational civilization, and a free and supportive

NEAPOLITAN NOSTALGIA

Naples, the Eighties. Fabio (Filippo Scotti) is a high school student who dreams of becoming a film director. The youngest of three children, he lives with his mother (Teresa Saponangelo) and his father (Toni Servillo) in a residen-tial area where intricate family events unfold. Just as he is giving up hope that Maradona will join Napoli, his beloved football team, the famous player finally accepts and comes to town. His incredible goals and wins have people cheering in the streets, singing from their balconies. Indeed, the Neapolitans turn El Pibe de Oro (The Golden Boy) into a living legend. In contrast with this jubilation, a terrible trage-dy awaits Fabio and his family. When a new, awful reality sets in, only his imagination will be able to save him and lead him into the future.





WRITER, DIRECTOR, AND PRODUCER RECEIVES THE MOST PRESTIGIOUS AWARDS FOR HIS ACCLAIMED THE HAND OF GOD

The Neapolitan director's feature film, having won of the Grand Jury Prize at the latest edition of the Venice Film Festival, will represent Italy at the Academy Awards® ceremony after the film's nomination for Best International Feature Film

Talent is an innate quality. In the case of Paolo Sorrentino, his narrative ability and technical skills are simply unmatched and help bring to life his pungent and disenchanted vision of the world, arousing in audience's profound sentiment and searing emotion tinged with cynicism and melancholy. Indeed, Sorrentino's talents have earned him a reputation as one of Italy's most beloved and sought-after filmmakers. His recurrent themes and dominant point of view in recent films has provoked criticism and debate within the cinematic community, though his Academy Award for Best International Feature Film in 2014 for the film "The Great Beauty" is a fitting honor for his indisputable talent and artistic courage. Sorrentino's directorial debut came in 2001 with "One Man Up," a suspenseful comedy-drama that tells the story of two strangers that bear the same name. He followed this sparkling work with "The Consequences of Love," a psychological thriller about a man whose mysterious and lonely life is shaken by a hesitant and forbidden love. Sorrentino's other works include "Il Divo," a commentary on the ecstasy and the dizzying abyss inherent in possessing great power; "This Must Be the Place," which narrates a journey into memory and a Yankee hyper-reality; "The Great Beauty," which focuses on a writer yearning for a seemingly unreachable happiness, and "Youth," about the possibility of rediscovering one's long-lost childhood. Sorrentino's work in television, including the series "The Young Pope" and "The New Pope," shows a preference to avoid the strict confines of rationality. In these shows, both of which were made for HBO, Sorrentino sets his imagination free to create extravagant, acrobatic, and symbolic narrations of a young, beautiful and tyrannical pope, whose heart is filled with an ancient sentiment of vengeance — a disposition that embodies the turbulence of the Church of the past.

Twenty years after his extraordinary debut, the Campanian filmmaker turns his attention to his own birthplace to shoot the profound and poignant "The Hand of God." This intimate autobiographical work takes Sorrentino back to his juvenile love interests and childhood passions, such as his admiration for legendary soccer player Diego Maradona, but also deals with more emotional episodes, such as a family tragedy that would change his life forever. This movie is a tale of family ties, fatal events, love and loss that sheds light on how Sorrentino's movie-making future was written in the stars. After seducing the jury at the Venice Film Festival, "The Hand of God" was submitted for the Best International Feature Film at the 94th Academy Awards and is currently competing for the most prestigious accolades of the season.

BREAKOUT ACTOR

Filippo Scotti, recently included among Variety Magazine's ten voung actors to watch, has been interested in acting from

an early age. Now the toast of Italian and international cinema, Scotti brings the leading character to life in "The Hand of God," Paolo Sorrentino's latest film. In 2018, Scotti played the lead role in the short film "La Gita" by Salvatore Allocca, presented at the Venice Film Festival and a winner for Best Direction and Best Photography. In 2019, Scotti was cast in the Netflix series "Luna Nera" and plays the lead in "lo e Spotty," by Cosimo Gomez. For the role of Fabio, Sorrentino's teen-age alter ego, Scotti received the Marcello Mastroianni Award at the Venice Film

AN AMERICAN PROJECT ALONGSIDE

"Mob Girl," is a film adaptation of the novel of the same name, written by Pulitzer Prize winning author Teresa Carpenter. The second film is a biopic dedicated to Sue Mengers, one of the most famous talent agents in Hollywood. The still untitled film was by six screenwriters including Lauren Schuker Blum, Rebecca Angelo and John Logan, a three-time Oscar nominee for "The Gladiator," "The Aviator" and "Hugo."

TRAILAN FILMARIISAX

Comprising talented actors and directors as well as amazing DPs, composers, costume designers, editors and producers, the Italian film industry boasts an array of skilled professionals who have helped establish it as one of the globe's best

The long and loving relationship between the Academy Awards and the Italian film industry is visible in the record number of wins enjoyed by Italian films in the Best International Film category. The acknowledgement of the high quality of Italian productions dates back to the Neorealist movement, when, in 1947, Vittorio De Sica's "Sciuscia" won a special prize that would prove the first of many Oscars for foreign language films. Many subsequent Italian directors were celebrated in Hollywood for their masterpieces, including Federico Fellini, Bernardo Bertolucci, Giuseppe Tornatore, and

Behind every big name there are countless Italian "artisans," that is, highly-skilled professionals, working as directors of photography, set designers, editors, costume designers and composers who have been collecting endless nominations and awards. Among them, we remember the four Oscars won by costume designer Milena Canonero (for "Barry Lyndon," "Chariots of Fire," "Marie Antoinette," and "The Grand Budapest Hotel"); the three earned by DP Vittorio Storaro (for "Apocalypse Now," "Reds," and "The Last Emperor"); and Best Production Design awards won by set-designing duo, Dante Ferretti and Federica Lo Schiavo (for "The Aviator," "Sweeney Todd," and "Hugo"). Other award-winning talents of the Italian film community include Carlo Rambaldi, acclaimed for the unforgettable special effects created for three fantasy and sciencefiction blockbusters: "King Kong," "Alien," and "E.T."; Maestro Ennio Morricone, the recipient of an Honorary Academy Award for his outstanding, decades-long music contributions and an Oscar for Tarantino's "The Hateful Eight"; set designers Danilo Donati and Luciana Arrighi; editor Pietro Scalia; costume designer Gabriella Pescucci; director of photography Pasqualino de Santis; musicians Nino Rota and Nicola Piovani; and make-up artists Alessandro Bertolazzi and Giorgio Gregorini. This substantial group of talented artists and their masterful skills have helped Italian productions gain recognition and fame on a global level.







CYRANO' COSTUME DESIGNER MASSIMO

From his grandmother's shop to the splendid

1600s costumes created for Joe Wright's movie

Ttaly's reputation as an international leader of fashion and flair hardly bears repeating. So, it should come as no surprise that Italian stylists, who work on the forefront of culture, creativity, and research, are some of the most acclaimed and sought-after in the world. Massimo Cantini Parrini is no exception. The product of a family of artists, he has honed his talent exploring characteristic Italian traditions over a long film career, earning him the moniker of "archeologist of fashion" for his immeasurable passion for discovering period garments. Born in Florence, Massimo Cantini Parrini was immediately plunged into the world of costuming by his maternal grandmother, who owned a tailor shop and introduced him to the craft of tailoring. Massimo began collecting period garments and soon amassed a collection of over 4000 original pieces with origins from 1630 to 1990, many of which were created by iconic designers.

A pupil of Piero Tosi, and a frequent collaborator with Oscar-winning costume designer Gabriella Pescucci - with whom he worked on over ten international productions -Cantini Parrini created the costumes for The Wholly Family" (Terry Gilliam, 2011), "Che strano chiamarsi Federico" (E. Scola, 2013), "Walesa: Man of Hope" (A. Wajda, 2014), "Tale of Tales" (M. Garrone, 2015), "Indivisibili" (E. de Angelis, 2016), "Dogman" (M. Garrone, 2018), "La terra dell'abbastanza," "Favolacce," "Americalatina" (Fratelli d'Innocenzo), and "Pinocchio" (M. Garrone, 2019).

After a number of well-deserved accolades, the genius Italian costume designer won his first Academy Award nomination for his extraordinary costumes created for the film version of Collodi's fairy tale. This year, he has once again been nominated for the industry's most prestigious award for his work on "Cyrano," the film adaptation of Emile Rostand's comedy inspired by Erica Schmidt's 2018 musical.




A RECORD SETTING 'EMPEROR

In the 1980s, a profound crisis in the Italian film industry resulted in very few Italian movies receiving Oscar nomi nations. But in 1988, in an amazing twist of events, Bernardo Bertolucci hit it big, bringing home an Academy Award for Best Picture, as well as other eight statuettes. To this day, "The Last Emperor" still holds a record as one of the most awarded movies in the history of the Academy, and Bertolucci is still the only Italian director who has won an Oscar for Best Director.











LITHEMADE-IN-ITALY animation BOASTS A HISTORY OF ALIA

From IGINIO STRAFFI's Rainbow to the latest productions, the landscape of Italian animated movies is rapidly changing

The past decade has been a period of rebirth and thrilling growth for Italian animation. This segment of the entertainment industry comprises 6,000 employees and an annual turnover of 180 million Euros. These impressive figures can be attributed to a number of factors, including the development of new online platforms and distribution channels; technological innovation and the blending of animation techniques with other languages; negotiations between state institutions and private companies through which the tax credit was increased up to 30%; and the talent and courage of producers, illustrators, and directors who have captured a significant share of the animation market and can now compete with their foreign colleagues on equal footing. The turning point for the Italian animation industry came over 20 years ago, when Iginio Straffi founded Rainbow, which has become the largest Italian animation studio in the Marche region, where Straffi was born. One of the most versatile and creative artists in the world, Straffi is the founder of the world-renowned Winx Club, an enduring brand that is not only a leader in media and retail, but has become a global viral phenomenon.

Over the years, Iginio Straffi has created a number of original projects like Tommy & Oscar; PopPixie; Huntik – Secrets & Seekers; the "Gladiatori di Roma" 3D production; Regal Academy; three CGI Winx Club movies; and the recent successful live action sitcom "Maggie & Bianca: Fashion Friends." His prolific work is a testament to his exceptional talent in exploring new frontiers of animation.



PUFFINS AND ARCTIC FRIENDS

FOR ILBE PRODUCTIONS

One series revolves around four puffins striking out on daring missions to solve life's daily problems, while the other is set in an icy landscape and narrates the adventures of Swifty, a fox who has finally found his dream job in the Arctic Blast Delivery Service. "Puffins" and "Arctic Friends" are two web series for kids created by Andrea lervolino and Lady Monica from ILBE production group. These series are under the direction of Giuseppe Squillaci, who assembled an all-Italian team of screenwriters, directors, and storyboard artists to complete five hundred episodes dedicated to web platforms and international TV distribution.

Among the nominees for the 2022 Academy Award for Best Animated Feature is the product of an all-Italian direction team and set in Italy. "Luca," produced by Pixar, is a nostalgic love letter to the childhood holidays of its author, Enrico Casarosa. Upon arrival, he enrolled in the School of Visual Arts and the Fashion Institute of Technology where he studied how to engage audiences in imagined worlds and learned the skills to succeed in a difficult industry. After a rewarding two-year stretch collaborating with filmmakers of such renowned as John Lasseter, Brad Bird, and Pete Docter, Casarosa has firmly established himself as a talent who has not forgotten his roots. Indeed, coming of age in the evocative atmosphere of Liguria provided the foundation for a successful leap into American animated cinema.

Celebrating DANTE SPINOTTI

The two-time Oscar-nominated Italian cinematographer work has spanned genres and cinematic trends during his four decades in the film industry.

In honor of his storied career, he will be presented with the "L.A., Italia Excellence Award"

Dante Spinotti is among the foremost directors of photography of our time. Through his masterful navigation of light and shadow, he has not only given shape to acclaimed film productions, but has become a symbol of Italian talent in the world of cinema. Born in 1943 in Carnia, in the region of Friuli, his first experience behind the camera came in Kenya, where he worked alongside his uncle Renato, a BBC cameraman. Spinotti worked extensively in television before making the leap into cinema. After his film debut in Sergio Citti's 1981 work, "Minestrone," Spinotti collaborated with some of the biggest names in Italian cinema, including Giacomo Battiato in "I paladini, storia d'armi e d'amori," then-newcomer Gabriele Salvatores in "A Midsummer's Night Dream," and, later, with Lina Wertmuller in "Sotto, sotto, strapazzato da anomala passione."

Spinotti's work embodies his profound photographic vision. His talent earned him a collaboration on Liliana Cavani's ambitious "The Berlin Affair," a film where disquieting, colorful scenes express Junichiro Tanizaki's murky imagination.

Spinotti firmly established himself as a leading artist after his work for Dino De Laurentiis in two US productions: Bruce Beresford's "Crimes of the Heart" and "Manhunter." The latter marked the start of a long and fruitful partnership between Spinotti and director Michael Mann. The two were immediately drawn to each other and continued working together on several projects. Their mutual artistic understanding is evidenced by four other splendid movies they collaborated on: "The Last of the Mohicans," "Heat," "The Insider" and "Public Enemies"; each of which are infused with Spinotti's visionary approach and sensitive selection of light and shadow.

Spinotti received his first Academy Award nomination for Curtis Hanson's "LA Confidential," for which he received praise for the chromatic effects used to extraordinarily replicate 1950s aesthetics. Over the years, Spinotti received many professional opportunities around the world, where he collaborated with notable artists such as Sam Raimi, Barbra Streisand, Garry Marshall, Brett Rattner, and Michael Apted in the US, while he was highly sought after by Ermanno Olmi, Giuseppe Tornatore, Cristina Comencini, and Roberto Benigni in Italy.

Spinotti's masterful shaping and control of light and shadow was not only an essential element of his moving making, but his talent has left an indelible mark on the world of cinematography.







This year, Los Angeles, Italia celebrates the centenary of a true master of the cinematic arts. A leader of international screen and stage productions, Vittorio Gassman was not only an artist rich with talent and appeal, but an iconic actor who transcends national borders and remains one of the world's most beloved performers

On June 29, 2000, Vittorio Gassman passed away at age 77. A unique artist, Gassman appeared on stage, radio, and television, though it was on the big screen where he shone brightest. Appearing in over one hundred movies - from "The Great War" and "For Love and Gold" to "The Easy Life" and "Scent of a Woman" - Gassman's performances never failed to showcase his distinctive style and irresistible charm that graced the Italian film industry for over sixty years.

After earning his degree at the Silvio D'Amico National Academy of Dramatic Arts in Rome, he went on to distinguish himself as one of the most gifted performers of his generation. On the stage, his expansive range of talent helped him excel in classic repertoire roles (i.e. Hamlet, Othello, Adelchi, Oreste), as well as in more contemporary works such as "A Streetcar Named Desire." His acclaimed performances earned him collaborations with the most prestigious theater companies of his time under the aegis of prominent directors.

Gassman's television career began with the staging of classic dramas that won him wide praise. His theatrical talent earned him regular appearances on "Il mattatore," the famous variety show where he was admired for his brilliant and versatile performances. After this successful start, he hit the big screen, where, following a brief stint in the US with Charles Vidor and Robert Rossen, he broke through in Mario Monicelli's "Big Deal on Madonna Street." Monicelli discovered Gassman's comic sparkle and helped him shape the unforgettable role of Peppe il pantera, a boxer who becomes a small-time criminal. This was only the beginning of Gassman's long and radiant career alongside the best directors of the well-known Italian-style comedy genre. Gassman portrayed an unforgettable array of characters personifying the hunger for life and redemption characteristic of the so-called 'Italian economic boom.' His performances in 1962 masterpiece "The Easy Life" and "I mostri" in 1963, both helmed by Dino Risi, exemplify his talent for bringing to life the comedy and emotion of everyday Italians. However, his roles were not limited to the outrageous and flamboyant, rather, a potential for melancholic and bitter performances emerged from behind his exuberant façade. His

impressive range was put on display in Monicelli's "The Great War," in which Gassman portrays a cowardly soldier who nevertheless dies a hero.

Despite his successful exploits in comedic productions – including the surreal "For Love and Gold," a milestone of 1970s Italian comedy - Vittorio Gassman would later take on and find great success in more obscure roles in projects of a different nature. For example, his portrayal of the blind and disenchanted captain of "Scent of a Woman," a role which earned him the Best Actor award at the Cannes Film Festival.

During the festival's latest edition at Hollywood's Chinese Theater, one up-and-coming Italian performer has attracted the attention of international media: Alessio Lapice, acclaimed for portraying Romolo in "The First King", Matteo Rovere's powerful and daring movie about the legendary founding of the city of Rome.

















RISING STAR:

Scarpetta is the latest in a long line of extraordinary stage actors whose dynastic success was recently narrated in Mario Martone's "The King of Laughter." However, comparisons between Eduardo Jr. and his celebrated ancestors (from the Scarpettas to the De Fi lippos) is misplaced. The son of actors Mario Scarpetta and Maria Basile, Eduardo Scarpet ta, Jr. is one of the most promising young fa ces in the Italian entertainment business. After



two small roles in Mordini's "Pericle il nero" and Martone's "Capri Revolution," Eduardo Scarpetta achieved mainstream popularity when he gave life to the character of Pasquale Peluso in the TV series "My Brilliant Friend." Scarpetta went on to win a leading role in "Carosello Carosone," in which he incarnated a true legend of international music, Renato Carosone. The future for Eduardo Jr. is bright, as he is slated to appear on the big screen with "La donna per me," a new comedy directed by Marco Martani, as well as in the TV series "The Ignorant Fairies" directed by Ferzan Ozpetek.











A STAR IS BORN:

The son of Senegalese immigrants, Ibrahima Gueye grew up in the village of Ladispoli, near Rome. Thanks to his outstanding ad lib abilities and irresistible spontaneity, he was selected from among 300 contenders to star in Edoardo Ponti's "The Life Ahead" at the age of 13. This budding young talent distinguished himself in a wonderful performance opposite legendary Italian actress, Sophia Loren, in her return to the big screen. Together, Loren and Gueye displayed a natural chemistry that blew in ternational audiences away.

Benedetta is one of the young feminine faces that the Italian cinema is betting on. With a background in fashion and music, Benedetta Porcaroli is now a charismatic actress who has been able to make the right choices under the direction of prominent Italian filmmakers. In 2016 she was selected by Paolo Genovese for "Perfect Strangers" where she played a small role that paved the way for more prominent future characters in movies like "Sconnessi" by Christian Marazziti, "Quanto Basta" by Francesco Falaschi, "Una vita spericolata" by Marco Ponti and "Tutte le mie notti" by Manfredi Lucibello. At the end of 2018, Porcaroli landed a leading role in an all Italian Netflix TV series: "Baby," alongside Alice Pagani and Anna Lou Castoldi. The series is inspired by the real story of "child prostitutes" in Parioli, an upper-class district of Rome. The film focuses especially on the family and cultural background of an area where two teenage girls ended up in a prostitution ring.

In 2019 Benedetta Porcaroli was chosen by the music band The Giornalisti and its frontman Tommaso Paradiso to appear in the music video, "Maradona y Pelé," and by Achille Lauro for his video, "19 Marzo." In 2020 she was cast in the feature film, "18 Presents," earning her a nomination for a David di Donatello award as Best Supporting Actress. A year later she was cast in another big screen hit: Stefano Mordini's "The Catholic School." This film depicts the environment in which germinated the warped seed that was to produce one of the darkest episodes in Italy's post-war history: the Circeo massacre. After starring in "The Shadow of the Day," opposite Riccardo Scamarcio, Benedetta will soon appear on the big screen in two important projects: Carolina Cavalli's "Amanda" and Francesca Archibugi's "The Hummingbird."

Camarcio is one of the most celebrated performers in the Italian film industry today. After a Successful debut as a rebellious and romantic heartthrob hero, Riccardo Scamarcio has proved his worth as a sensitive and engaged actor in arthouse movies across various genres in a variety of

Since that debut performance, in which he won over the hearts of female audiences with his charm and devilish good looks, the Apulia-born actor has built a distinguished career. Scamarcio made his mainstream debut in Marco Tullio Giordano's "La meglio gioventù" as part of an ensemble cast, in which he played a small but significant role in a tragic family saga. He owes his fame, however, to Michele Placido's "Romanzo Criminale," which earned him a Golden Globe for Best Breakthrough Actor, an acknowledgment that changed his life and turned him into one of the most sought after actors by prominent Italian directors.

Over the years, Scamarcio has collaborated with the best: Michele Placido (who recently directed him in the role of Caravaggio), Sergio Rubini, Pupi Avati, Sergio Castellitto, and Nanni Moretti to name a few. He also worked with Paolo Sorrentino who, in the first reel of his movie "Loro," cast him in the role of a speculator without scruples, as well famed international filmmakers such as Abel Ferrara and Costa-Gavras.

In Daniele Luchetti's 2007 drama "My Brother is an Only Child," Scamarcio plays a young factory worker involved in the fierce social battles of the Seventies. In Ferzan Ozpetek's "Loose Cannons," he incarnated a young homosexual man suffocated by his bourgeois family's need for respectability. In "Pericle the Black," based on Giuseppe Ferrandino's crime novel of the same name, he portrayed a villain in the service of the mob who finds the strength to change his life in the woman he loves. Scamarcio continued to showcase his talent in Sergio Castellitto's "You Can't Save Yourself Alone," Guido Lombardi's "Il ladro di giorni," and Valeria Golino's "Euforia," the latter earning him a David di Donatello award nomination for Best Leading Actor. Alongside his acting work, he has produced several movies alongside filmmaker Valeria Golino, while making a point to scout for new talents and explore controversial themes.

On stage, he was acclaimed in "I tre moschettieri," "L'intelligenza, il cuore, le dita," and "Romeo e Giulietta." On international sets, Scamarcio worked alongside Paul Haggis ("Third Person"), John Wells ("Burnt"), Abel Ferrara ("Pasolini"), George Ratliff ("Welcome Home"), Chad Stahelski ("John Wick: Chapter 2"), and John Wells ("Il sapore del successo").

2006 (February 26-March 4)
The Italian cinema passed
the test at the first L.A. Italia Festival
with over 10,000 viewers attending thirty
movie screenings.

movie screenings. Even though our Academy Award nominees didn't win - Cristina Comencini, director of "Don't Tell"; Gabriella Pescucci, costume designer for "Charlie and the Chocolate Factory" and Dario Marinelli, music composer for "Pride & Prejudice" - the Capri in the World Institute took home the awareness that "... a solid bridge for a cultural exchange is being built – since 1995 – between the Island of Capri with its "Capri, Hollywood" festival and Los Angeles, California," as declared by Pascal Vicedomini, founder and producer of these two events. Hollywood also witnessed the debut of festival co-founders Marina Cicogna, Franco Nero, Lina Wertmüller and Tony Renis (regarded as the musical 'soul' of the group and immediately elected its "Honorary Chairman"). For starters, the 2006 L.A. Italia event, whose official poster of the festival featured a night shot of the Colosseum, enjoyed the support of Cim Group Inc

(with its principal Shaul Kuba), the Lazio Region, and Rai Trade, as well as Mibac (D.G.Cinema). Among the attractions that mostly engaged the audience, we recall: 1) Lina Wertmüller's film retrospective: The well-known Italian director was treated to a Hollywood party in her honor organized by producer David Codikov, complete with a welcoming speech by Al Pacino. She was also invited to lecture a class of students attending the University Southern California; 2) A retrospective about the talented Gabriele Muccino, presenting his first all-American movie with Will Smith; 3) Valentino and Gabriella Pescucci's costume exhibitions, the first based on nine elegant party gowns created for Gwyneth Paltrow, Renée Zellweger, Cate Blanchett, Kate Beckinsale, Jennifer Garner, Kate Hudson, Sandra Bullock and Elle MacPherson; the second on nine costumes created by Sartoria Tirelli in Rome for Michelle Pfeiffer, Jessica Lange, Uma Thurman, Demi Moore, Monica Bellucci, Jacqueline Bisset, Catherine Deneuve, Robert De Niro and Johnny Depp; 5) A photo expo on cinema in the Lazio Region, attended by two masters of the Italian haute cuisine:

chefs Massimo Riccioli and Anna Dente; 6)
NIAF's big gala night at the Regent Beverly
Wilshire led by Jack
Valenti (then the long-time president of the Motion Picture Association of America) with two exceptional guests:
Oscar —winning actor Ernest Borgnine and L.A. Mayor Antonio
Villaraigosa.

Actors Raoul Bova, Stefania Rocca, Enrico Lo Verso and Carlo

Carlei stood out among the official delegation, as did songwriter Gigi D'Alessio who was touring the West Coast at that time. Among the illustrious guests were Oscar recipients Norman Jewison and Jon Voight (who recently was the extraordinary protagonist of the Rai-Lux Vide TV movie dedicated to Pope John Paul II, a role that won him and producer Tom Sternberg the L.A. Italia Excellence Award, designed by Micucci). With them were Paul Mazursky, Jacqueline Bisset, Dolph Lundgren, Roxanna Arquette, the up-and-coming star Gerard Butler, Keith Carradine and finally, producers Larry Turman, Lawrence Bender, Steven Paul and Barry Navidi.

The divine Ms. Sophia Loren made an appearance at the Silvia Damiani event.

2007 (February 18-24) This was the year of the big popular festival breakthrough on the West Coast: costume designer Milena Canoero was awarded her third Oscar – for Sofia Coppola's "Marie Antoinette". Sadly no prize went to makeup magicians Signoretti and Sodano.

The L.A. Italia event calendar presented a brilliant retrospective dedicated to legendary movie master Mario Monicelli, who was presented with a Lifetime Achievement Award by General Consul Diego Brasioli and IIC Director Francesca Valente, as well as with honors from the University of Southern California by Dean Elizabeth Dailey. This was the year of the collaboration with Shoah Foundation and Mimmo Calopresti's documentary, "Volevo solo vivere", screened on the opening day of the festival. The emotionally-charged

event engaged both audiences and the media, who rushed in to listen to the speech given by Douglas Greenberg, Executive Director of USC's Shoah Foundation Institute for Visual History and Education. It was also the year of the charity gala event for the movie "Invisible Children", produced by MKFilm and Maria Grazia Cucinotta with UNICEF and the World Food Program. There was also a memorable tribute to maestro Ennio Morricone, who received the Academy's Lifetime Achievement Award from Clint Eastwood. Not to mention Italian rocker Vasco Rossi's surprise appearance at the special screening of Stefano Salvati's video-clip, in which he was the lead character. The 2007 edition guests included Raoul Bova with Federico Moccia, Claudia Gerini with Federico Zampaglione and, next to Valeria Golino, Hollywood first-timer Riccardo Scamarcio, who connected immediately with Jeff Goldblum. Director Giulio Base, together

with Dolph Lundgren and the Cruz sisters, Penelope and Monica, introduced his new movie "L'inchiesta". Italian-American screenwriter Bobby Moresco (Academy Award for "Crash") debuted as festival chairman that year, too. At the Chinese Theatre, and at the Italian Lounge at Trastevere in Hollywood & Highland Center (where singer Agostino Penna performed beautifully), Oscar winner Pietro Scalia, Carlo Gabriel Nero, Stefano Veneruso, Martina Stella, Luca Lionello, actors Matthew Modine, John Savage, Gina Gershon, film directors Harold Becker and Mick Davis, and producers Avi Lerner and Chiara Tilesi were there too.

The official image of the 2007 Festival edition was Venice's

Grand Canal, owing to an explicit request by the Venice Casino that supports the event together with Cinecittà Holding, the Lazio Region, the Campania Region, Sangemini and Cafe do Brazil.

2008 (February 17-23) The festival that year started in the best possible way: Bernardo Bertolucci got a star on the Hollywood Walk of Fame, a tribute granted by the Hollywood Chamber of Commerce upon the request of the Capri in the World Institute. The Maestro was unable to attend due to his ailing health but nevertheless his star was unveiled in front of the Chinese Theatre. The classic Italian cinema was

The classic Italian cinema was represented by directors Carlo Lizzani and Citto Maselli, who were given

the IIC Lifetime Achievement award by
General Consul Nicola Faganello, and
who – at the Chinese Theatre – gave an
award to an exceptional guest: ItalianAmerican actor and director Sylvester
Stallone.

Dante Ferretti, however, (with Francesca Lo Schiavo) was the main attraction as he received his second Oscar for his design of Tim Burton's "Sweeney Todd" sets. The same thrill was generated when composer Dario Marianelli basked in his moment of glory, bringing home the legendary statuette for scoring Joe Wright's "Atonement". The only one left out was the third Italian candidate, Andrea Jublin, a contender in the short film category.

The Italian delegation also included actor and filmmaker Michele Placido, Lina Sastri, Raoul Bova, Enrico Lo Verso and newcomers Valeria Solarino (the Festival 'godmother'), Federico Moccia, Francesco Apolloni, Louis Nero, Ilaria Borrelli, Maurizio Aiello and Antonella Ponziani.

Famous Italian songwriter Ron and the Bologna-born 'soulman' Andrea Mingardi were highly appreciated for their musical contributions.

Next to them, a few giants of the US industry: Oscar winners Steven Zaillian, Paul Haggis and F. Murray Abraham (who was involved with Stefano Todini and Patrizia Pellegrino in a small movie shot in Umbria). And then Steven Seagal, Keith Carradine, Treat Williams, Tomas Arana, Johan Collins, Lindsay Lohan, Sofia Vergara (still unknown to the mainstream), Romina Power with her brother Tyrone Jr. and producers Mark Canton, Jeremy Thomas, Kevin King and Humberto Gatica.

The official image of the 2008 edition was the Gulf of Naples projected onto a number of Hollywood buildings. The size of the audience revealed the growth of the event: about 13,000 people attended the

Italian Art Gallery set up at the Hollywood & Highland Center. A photographic exhibition was arranged by the Experimental Centre of Cinematography about Bernardo Bertolucci with the title "Durante la rivoluzione" and "La Via del Petrolio" (in collaboration with Eni) was screened. Much admiration was generated by the costumes designed by artist Catia Dottori for Lizzani's film "Hotel Meina" and by the haute couture creations by late designer Egon Von Furstenberg (presented by his children Alex and Tatiana and by his ex-wife Diane von Furstenberg, now a fashion icon). 15,000 viewers visited the Mann Chinese 6 theatre to watch a selection of contemporary and classic movies. Among the other events, particularly appreciated was the tribute to Luciano Pavarotti (with the screening of the movie "Yes, Giorgio"), a few months after the tenor's death.

2009 (February 15-21) The work of legendary Vittorio de Sica was celebrated, with speeches by actor-director Dennis Hopper and Mark and James Canton at the Mann Chinese 6 Theatre, where they expressed their love for the Italian cinema "maestro." De Sica's son Christian and grandson Brando proudly waved the Oscar won by the filmmaker (for "La Ciociara"), to the audience which included film director Pupi Avati and his film-producer brother Antonio, both of whom received a warm Hollywood welcome as witnesses of the great contemporary cinema who have made their mark on the history of world entertainment. Pupi Avati was lauded with a movie retrospective, the IIC prize, and a tribute at U.S.C. arranged by young professor Alex Ago and about 500 students.

Next to them, Oscarwinning director Gabriele Salvatores and actor Fabio De Luigi attended the world premiere of their movie "Happy Family". The event was highlighted on US television as that two exceptional 'godfathers' were to welcome their Italian colleagues at the Mann Chinese 6 Theatre: Sylvester Stallone and Samuel L. Jackson. 2010 L.A. Italia started under the best of auspices due to the participation of director Enzo G. Castellari, underlined - on Sunday February 28th – by the arrival at the Mann Chinese 6 Theatre of celebrated Italian-American colleague Quentin Tarantino (nominated for eight Oscars for the movie "Inglourious Basterds"

loosely inspired by Castellari's film "Quel maledetto treno blindato"). Among the other festival stars: the étoile Roberto Bolle who became the symbol of this year's festival, as well as actors Kim Rossi Stuart and Luigi Lo Cascio with their film retrospectives. Jazz piano player Stefano Bollani wowed the audience with his Hollywood debut. The all-Italian happening in Hollywood, on the eve of Oscar night, introduced costume designer Antonella Cannarozzi, nominated for the film "I Am Love" by Guadagnino, as well as Italian-US actress Melissa Leo (born in Salerno) who won a Best Actress Academy Award for "The Fighter".

Among the most appreciated guests of the entire week were Danish filmmaker Susan Bier (later an Oscar recipient), Joel Schumacher (holding court during a lunch at Tod's on Rodeo Drive), Sofia Vergara (now a real star), Harold Becker, Luck Evans, Mark Canton, Malin Akerman, Robert Davi, Elsa Pataki, Paul Weller, Nastassja Kinski, Jacqueline Bisset, John Savage, Fisher Stevens. And many other Italians attended, such as artists residing in California: Pietro Scalia, Dante Spinotti, Gabriella Cristiani, Gisella Marengo. The event closed at Silvia Damiani and Tomas Arana's mansion.

2012 Los Angeles, Italia's seventh edition opened with a tribute to Dario Argento's work as a master of horror cinema, premiering his "Dracula 3D", that earned him a gala in his honor at the subsequent Cannes Film Festival. However, 2012 was also the year of the third Oscar for Dante Ferretti and Francesca Lo Schiavo, for Martin Scorsese's "Hugo"; this acknowledgement stirred intense

Sanremo Song Context)) as festival godmother. Among the most memorable moments of the 7th Los Angeles, Italia Festival, were the performances of musicians Enzo Gragnaniello and Piero Gallo at IIC, and at home with producers Avi Lerner and Heidi Jo Markel, together with Danny Glover, Mischa

Barton, Nastassja Kinski and John Savage.

Unforgettable was the tribute to legendary Peppino Di Capri, which inaugurated a strong partnership with the Grammy Museum, and opening the door for a similar event on a yearly

The musician from Capri received a special award bestowed upon him by the great Mike Stoller, the celebrated composer for Elvis Presley. Among the most welcomed guests of the festival were directors Joel Schumacher and Kenny Ortega, as well as actors Joe Mantegna and Joan Collins.

2013 Chairman Rick Nicita and President Martha De Laurentiis kicked off the 8th edition of LA ITALIA which took place from February 17 to 23 2013 with a real Hollywood red carpet: Al Pacino collected the first Jack Valenti Legend Award from the hands of well-known anchorman Larry King while actor Michele Placido and producer and director Iginio Straffi were honored with the LA Italia Excellence Award. Right afterwards it was the turn of other two stars: producer Harvey Weinstein and rising star director David O. Russell who publicly revealed his Italian origins (his mother was from Calabria).

Also actor Gerard Butler appeared among the many stars who flocked to support the Italian event.

Two days afterwards Weinstein was again under the Hollywood spotlight for the arrival of Quentin Tarantino e Christoph Waltz who were later awarded for






The traditional event at the Italian Institute of Culture in Los Angeles was attended by an exceptional guest: Milena Canonero, one of the brightest Italian artists whose talent is respected in Hollywood and in the rest of the world. A few days later she received her fourth Oscar as Best Costume Designer for Wes Anderson's acclaimed "Grand Budapest Hotel."

The LA, Italia Excellence Award was given to Italian tenor Vittorio Grigolo, who on the opening night of the Festival paid tribute to Frank Sinatra's legend singing his evergreen songs. 2016 The festival's 11th edition was particularly prestigious as it paid tribute to Maestro Ennio Morricone with a coveted Star on the Hollywood Walk of Fame near the Chinese Theatre, our traditional venue in Los Angeles. The ceremony was attended by Quentin Tarantino, the director of "The Hateful Eight," whose Oscar-winning score was written by the celebrated music composer. However, Morricone was not the only guest who attracted the attention of the Hollywood community on the eve of the Academy Awards. The Capri in the World Institute also celebrated Neapolitan filmmaker Mario Martone in Los Angeles, with screenings of his most significant works which are praised in America, for their strength of expression and sharp vision. On February 21st, the festival opened with "Una giornata particolare," Ettore Scola's masterpiece starring Sophia Loren and Marcello Mastroianni; The movie was selected to celebrate the Italian film director who passed away last

It was celebrated at the opening of the annual festival that takes place in Hollywood during the week preceding the Academy Awards.

Surrounded by many Italian colleagues, including Giovanni Veronesi, who was in Los Angeles for the premiere of his movie "Non è un paese per giovani." Gibson did not miss the chance to express his love for Bella Italia: "I love Italy, and I always want to go there, whenever I can" he said as he was speaking about the filming in Matera of his controversial movie "The

Passion of Christ."

The glamorous ceremony at the Chinese Six Theatres was attended by a vast audience comprised of filmmakers, movie stars, government officials, the media and friends of Italy. Gibson received the statuette from his longtime friend Sylvester Stallone, who in turn was oresented with the Jack Valenti Award. 2018 Luca Guadagnino was visibly moved when, a few days before the Oscars ceremony, he was honored alongside producer and editor Marco Morabito on the stage of Hollywood's TCL Chinese Theatre. This was one of the most thrilling days of the 2018 edition of the Los Angeles, Italia Film Fashion and Art Fest which traditionally precedes the Academy Awards and whose goal is promoting the best of Italian cinema along its key players, during a week of screenings, events, meetings and galas. 

Alessandro Preziosi and twin sisters Angela and Marianna Fontana were the first Italian movie stars to accept their 2019 Italian Excellence Awards at the Chinese Theatre. Preziosi greeted the audience with a performance honoring Luigi Pirandello; the actor also presented a selection of his films including the recent "Nessuno come noi" by Volfango de Biasi. Marianna Fontana presented "Capri-Revolution," an exclusive chapter that belongs to a hypothetical film trilogy through which director Mario Martone aims at reflecting of time and history. Angela Fontana is the leading character in a feature film dedicated to the Basilicata region. The screening of 'Lucania' paid a tribute to the city of Matera, the 2019 European Capital of Culture, and to the iconic filmmaker Francis Ford Coppola (whose family comes from that area), on his 80th birthday, to honor his strong ties to his Italian roots. The 2019 edition of the festival, chaired by Igino Straffi, a leader in the Italian animation industry, was attended by actress Maria Grazia Cucinotta, Hayma Washington, former president and CEO of the Academy of Television Arts & Sciences, screenwriter Nick Vallelonga (who later went on to win two Academy Awards for "The Green Book"), Andy Garcia, the American actor of Cuban descent, the young Italian talent Matteo Rovere (who presented "Il primo re," an original film on Rome's founding entirely spoken in proto-italic language) and the legendary Franco Nero, one of the most charismatic personalities of the Italian cinema, beloved by such film luminaries as Huston, Petri, Bellocchio, Chabrol and an inspiration for Quentin

Sergio Corbucci's 1966 movie "Django." The festival's closing ceremony was attended by many contenders for the Academy's 'golden statuette'. Included were Vallelonga, Adam McKay, director of "Vice," one of the nominees in the 'Best Film' category, Nicholas Britell and Terence Blanchard the composers of 'If the Street Could Talk" from the "BlacKkKlansman, Marc Shaiman and Scott Wittman, writers of "The Place Where Lost Things Go," a new song from "Mary Poppins Returns," and Anthony Rossomando, one of the writers of "Shallow," which was performed by Lady Gaga and

The big playwright Eduardo de Filippo was honored with the screening of the movie "The Mayor of Rione Sanità," a modern adapation of Di Filippo's theatre piece of the same name which narrates a crime story set against the backdrop of Naples. The film was directed by Mario Martone and premiered in US and Italy by its leading male character: Francesco di Leva.

The 'LA Italia - Global Fashion Icon Award' was assigned to Chiara Ferragni, the internationally famed influencer and digital entrepreuner with 18.3 million followers on Instagram. Her story is narrated in the docufilm directed by Elisa Amoruso "Chiara Ferragni

However, in the midst of the devastating effects of the COVD-19 pandemic, the Capri in the World Institute led the way in safely reopening US theatres to Italian film. From April 18th-24th of last year, Hollywood's renowned Chinese Theater welcomed the 16th edition of the Los Angeles, Italia festival. Hosted by "Green Book" Oscar winner Nick Vallelonga and Italian-Canadian producer Andrew Iervolino, the event proudly featured the most exciting movies of a season tormented by lockdowns, closed theaters, and isolation.

Once again, the staging of Los Angeles, Italia heralded the international film industry's most anticipated event of the

FROM THE LEGENDARY SOPHIA LOREN TO THE HERETICAL POET PIER PAOLO PASOLINI

↑ retrospective will be dedicated to Pier Paolo Pa-Solini on the centenary of his birth to celebrate the life and work of one of the most clear-eyed and courageous Italian intellectuals of the 1900s. After assigning the Visionary Award last September to Sophia Loren, the iconic Italian actress beloved all over the world, the Los Angeles Academy Museum of Motion Pictures will honour the poet, philosopher, and filmmaker Pier Paolo Pasolini with a complete retrospective of his narrative films interspersed with some unique short and documentary works from his prolific career. Though he was a filmmaker for just over a decade, Pasolini's impact

on cinema is profound. An openly gay man and outspoken critic of capitalism and Europe's bourgeois establishment, Pasolini remained in the crosshairs of the elite for his entire career, which ended tragically when he was murdered weeks before the premiere of his most incendiary condemnation of the upper classes: "Salò, or the 120 Days of Sodom." He was 53 years old.

"Carnal knowledge: the films of Pier Paolo Pasolini," curated by Cinecittà and the Bologna Film Library, divides the Italian filmmaker's oeuvre into three main periods: his reinvention of Italian neorealism as a potently lyrical vehicle for devastating depictions of modern life ("Accattone," "Mamma Roma"); his searing portrayals of the depravity of European society ("Teorema," "Porcile"); and the shocking one-two punch that was his "Trilogy of Life," a celebration of the primal pleasures of sex set in Antiquity, and its antithesis, the devastatingly bleak World War II horror film, "Salò."

The retrospective is the first initiative envisaged by a new agreement between Cinecittà and the Academy Museum of Motion Pictures that over the next five years it will present a number of shows, exhibitions and activities dedicated to Italian cinema, strengthening the two-decades-long relationship between the two institutions. The design of the Academy Museum of Motion Pictures was overseen by Italian architect Renzo Piano and opened to the public on September 30, 2021.





OSCAR WINNERS STORARO, FERRETTI, LO SCHIAVO TOGETHER FOR AN ART

One of the most famous masterpieces of all times - Leonardo Da Vinci's painting, "The Last Supper," comes to life in "The Last Supper: The Living Tableau," a nine-minute long tableau vivant. The scene opens on a timeless landscape to the touching notes of Rossini's "Stabat Mater." As the Apostles muse about the reason for the gathering, Jesus enters the room and sits at the center of the table. After blessing the disciples and the meal, he announces that he will be betrayed by one of them. The short movie was created and shot by filmmaker and artist Armondo Linus Acosta, who collaborated with a first-class team of Oscar winning Italians including Vittorio Storaro (DP), Dante Ferretti and Francesca Lo Schiavo (set design and decoration)























DIRECTED BY OSCAR WINNER GABRIELE SALVATORES IN 'CASANOVA'S RET





THE MIDST OF WAR

After "Il barbiere di Siviglia" and "La Traviata," Mario Martone takes Giuseppe Verdi's opera "Othello" to a "war stage," the contemporary Middle East where Western soldiers mingle with migrants and victims of a never-ending conflict. Without betraying the Boito libretto or the typically Shakespearian psychological traits of the characters, the daring production - that successfully opened the opera season at Naples' San Carlo Theater in the presence of Italian President Sergio Mattarella - reminds us that violence against women is deeply rooted in the past.



Another golden season has begun for the brilliant Neapolitan author who seamlessly spreads his talents among theater, cinema, and opera. Teaming up IPPOLITA DI MAJO, he has conquered the world of cinema with a comedy-drama dedicated to Eduardo Scarpetta that has already won praise at the Venice Film Festival

ario Martone, born in 1959, is one of the most interesting film makers of our time. His art represents Lan endless and courageous pursuit of truth, while his authentic and poetic vision of reality sets him apart as a versatile, cultivated, and curious author. His talent grew from an early immersion in stage performance, music, and literature, and today spans several media and forms, leading him to a success career on both film sets and theater stages.

Seing MARIO

After cutting his teeth on avant-garde theater, with works such as "Falso Movimento" and "Teatri Uniti," Martone made his directorial film debut in 1992 with "Death of a Neapolitan Mathematician," which narrated the last days of the life of university professor Renato Caccioppoli. The film brought Martone's established talent to a more mainstream audience and earned him the Grand Jury Prize at the Venice Film Festival. One year later, Martone directed "Rasoi." This cinematic triumph presents real-life stories against a theatrical background to expose a complex and tragic patchwork vision of Naples. Martone presents simultaneously the city as both modern and primitive, even wounded by a double-edged blade: a razor, as the movie title suggests.

"Nasty Love," the recipient of the David di Donatello and Nastro d'Argento awards, marked Martone's ultimate recognition at the 1995 Cannes Film Festival. The Neapolitan director would go on to explore the 19th century in "We Believed," a painfully limpid fresco portraying the uprisings of the Italian Risorgimento which led to the Italian unification.

In 2014, Martone received praise for one of his most ambitious and beloved projects: "Leopardi." The film, centering on the life and education of Giacomo Leopardi, a leading figure in Italian and international literature, competed for the Golden Lion at the 71st Venice International Film Festival.

In "Qui rido io," which was selected for competition at the 78th edition of the Venice Film Festival, Martone once again wrestles with his signature themes, namely, cinema, theater, and history. This biographical film explores the personality of Eduardo Scarpetta, the famous Neapolitan actor and playwright whose fundamental contributions to Italian entertainment and culture are matched by the successes and fame of uis three illegitimate children. With a comedic rhythm unusual for Martone, "Qui rido io" evokes our roots and explores history's lonely and unappreciated characters, looking for a liaison between past and present, showing how yesterday's triumphs and defeats live again in the contradictions of our time.



THE TRIO THAT ROCKED ITALIAN THEATRES

There's Eduardo, the intellectual, who admired Pirandello and became one of the most acclaimed Italian playwrights of the twentieth century. His works have been staged all over the world. Then, Peppino, an extraordinary cinema and theater performer who, having lived for many years in Eduardo's shadow, remains torn by conflicting feelings for his older brother. Finally, the talented and untamed Titina, who's unconditional love for her brothers made her their guiding light and compass when the stormy sea of emotions became difficult to navigate. Ultimately, rivalry divided the family in 1944. However, Eduardo, Peppino, and Titina, each in different ways and for different reasons, remain etched in the imagination of the Italian public. Rubini's film tells the story of these three icons before they went their separate ways. The siblings gave birth to an acclaimed theater company, praised throughout Italy for their talent, trail-blazing techniques, and productions that would define a new era in the Italian stage tradition. This revolution was ushered in by these three artists with a common and tumultuous family background, but with distinct personalities and talents. Their mother, Luisa, encouraged them to smooth their own rough edges so they could pursue their dreams with faith, ambition, and each other. Later on, the matriarch's role in bonding the siblings together was assumed by Titina. Despite her love for her siblings, she was unable to resolve the deeply-rooted conflict between Eduardo and Peppino. Though they eventually disbanded, the De Fillipos left a legacy of forward-looking, ingenious artistry, characterized by the ability to smile about life and its miseries.

Christmas Eve, 1931: Inside Naple's Kursaal movie theater, the black and white Ufootage of Clark Gable and Carole Lombard gives way to the premiere screening of "Natale in casa Supiello." Eduardo, Peppino, and Titina De Filippo's dream has come true: they can now perform with their own company, bearing their name. It's the Teatro Umoristico "i De Filippo."

This iconic sequence takes place in the finale, after a long flashback portraying the redemption of the three siblings – the two illegitimate sons and one daughter of Eduardo Scarpetta, the wealthiest and most highly acclaimed actor and playwright at the turn of the twentieth century. In the Scarpetta family, Titina, Eduardo, and Peppino appear condemned to marginalization. Fated to play a secondary role in the shadow of their tentacular and arrogant family, it these three would seemingly be forced to languish in their father's rejection. However, Eduardo Scarpetta had unwittingly passed on his artistic talent to the three children. This hereditary gift allowed Titina, Eduardo, and Peppino to turn their emotional wounds into a life of extraordinary success, rising above their familial turmoil to become prominent artists of the early 1900s in their own

Sergio Rubini has pursued the idea of a movie about the De Fillipo family for years, "I wanted to depict them as The Beatles; like young womanizers, traitors and cantankerous artists set in a typical Italian environment, where they experience social exclusion and redemption." With this latest film, Rubini, the actor and director discovered by Federico Fellini and selected to play Fellini in "The Interview," has realized this dream. The result is a passionate, poignant, humorous, and, sometimes, bittersweet portrait of a family whose life unfolds through both private incidents and public exploits. It

is a story of redemption and hope about three young people, blessed with talent, who are able to overcome years of hardship and intellectual conflict. Ultimately, by cutting loose from their paternal figure, they would fundamentally renew the landscape of twentieth century theater. Festival Chairman Robert Davi has called "The De Filippo Brothers," which will inaugurate Los Angeles, Italia 2022, "a magical event." Davi continues, "We selected it to open the festival because we are eager to honor the brilliant and cultured director of the movie, Sergio Rubini. This high-end production is bound to be exported to the US, where the audience will be delighted to discover the story of this genius-like family reflecting the life and manners of the early 1900s in Naples and Italy. We are excited to present the movie to the Chinese Theater's audiences, which will surely be enthralled by its story."

SCOUNDRELS TRAVEL BACK IN TIME

A close-knit group of comedians get together for the third chapter of a crowd-pleasing action-fantasy saga

The seemingly unlikely, but certainly comical, criminal gang is back on the big screen for their new mission: stealing Leonardo da Vinci's iconic painting "La Gioconda." How will they do it? By traveling back in time to 1943.

After the successful first two chapters, the third - and most likely, last - instalment of the franchise directed by Massimiliano Bruno, sees the return of stars Marco Giallini, Gian Marco Tognazzi, Giulia Bevilacqua, Ilenia Pastorelli, and Edoardo Leo, in addition to two newcomers, Carolina Crescentini and Giampaolo Morelli. The band of scoundrels ultimately succeeds in their heist, but as they are fleeing with the stolen painting, they are forced to seek refuge at Moreno's grandmother, Adele's, house. has a chance to see her as a young woman, but also



Director Alessandro Pondi defines "School of Mafia," his third directorial efforts, as a western black comedy. The film, a tribute to his favorite movies "from Ettore Scola to the Coen Brothers and John Carpenter," blends a variety of genres and themes - parody, spaghetti western, coming of age, adventure - to narrate a story that is, in fact, not funny at all.

Tony Masseria (Michele Ragno), Joe Cavallo (Guglielmo Poggi), and Nick Di Maggio (Giuseppe Maggio) are three young men from New York. Each of them are full of dreams, ambitions, and plans. Nick is a guitar player who has been selected to take part in the most famous US talent show, Joe is a Military Academy cadet, and Tony is a dance teacher who is still undecided about his sexuality and aspires to be a choreographer. Ambition, however, is not the only thing they have in common. These three are also bound by the fact that their parents are all in the mafia.

Due to their disruptive family lives, the destinies of the three young men is fraught, at best. Their plans become even more upended when their parents make the drastic decision to send them back to Sicily to be trained by Don Turi 'u Appicciaturi (Nino Frassica), the most feared godfather, in order to become real mafia bosses. Despite Don Turi's efforts, the three are not particularly inclined to abide by the rulebook of the model Mafioso. Their subversive, brave, and evolutionary energy is stronger than anything else.

"School of Mafia" was acclaimed as one of the funniest comedies of Summer 2021. The cast, under Pondi's direction, strikes an exciting balance between film veterans such as Nino Frassi ca, Emilio Solfrizzi, Fabrizio Ferracane, Paolo Calabresi, and Paola Minaccioni alongside three young talents to watch: Giuseppe Maggio, Guglielmo Poggi and Michele Ragno.



We meet businessmen who denounce, magistrates who investigate, teachers and educators who are personally committed, journalists who do not back down despite the threats, relatives of the victims of the ndrangheta who do not give up, associations and companies that join together and propose new ways of doing business. "If We Told the Truth" is a journey involving students, teachers, journalists, magistrates, businessmen, artists and educators who strive to envisage a new path to a world finally free from the virus of organized crime.

Education on legality and art as a tool to fight crime, these are the themes that guide Giulia Minoli's work. For over 14 years, she has been co-founder, vice president and PR and fund-raising manager of CCO - Crisi Come Opportunità Onlus, (Crisis as Opportunity) a non-governmental organization specialized in social communication, multimedia workshops and training platforms to ensure the professionalization of young beneficiaries and the visibility of the local associations' partners. From Lebanon to Brazil, in its first years the Association was focused on the international environment. Emanuela Giordano focused her work on theater: she wrote and directed with Giulia Minoli: "Ten Stories Just Like This," a civil work on organized crime, commissioned by the San Carlo Theater in Naples and replicated throughout Italy. A project in schools was born from this show to raise awareness of the organized crime infiltration problem.

MY PLACE IS HERE

Lombardy, Italy – 26th March 2020. The town's public hospital is overwhelmed by people infected by a previously unknown virus. For 30 days, Michele Aiello modestly films the unprecedented and indispensable relationships that unite the patients and healthcare staff. Protected by masks, separated by screens, the nurses and the ill become closer through the hardship. With a delicate but direct approach, the film affirms the humanity that permeates relationships within the hospital. Even though it is painful at times, "My Place Is Here" brings an intimate dimension to this slice of raw reality, far removed from voyeurism, from heroic apology or from the usual anxiety-inducing media representation.











HEIRLOOM WHY ITALIAN AMERICANS

LOVE TO GARDEN?

"Heirloom" tells the story of a mother and daughter who set out to discover why Italian Americans love to garden. Along their journey, they meet notable members of the Italian American

community (like Isabella Rossellini), and even travel to Italy itself. "Heirloom" is a recipient of the Russo Brothers Italian American Film Forum grant. Spearheaded by Hollywood directors Anthony and Joe Russo, the Film Forum is an initiative to fund films depicting and exploring the Italian American experience for the benefit of future generations.

ONE HUNDRED AND EIGHT STORIES OF MEDITERRANEAN FISHERMEN

On the far western shores of Sicily, separated from Tunisia by just under two hundred kilometers, Mazara del Vallo is a town historically, inextricably linked to fishing. Although no longer enjoying the glory of the "golden years," the fishing community continues its hunt for red shrimp in the deep seabed of the Mediterranean, close to the Libyan, Tunisian, Cypriot and Turkish coasts. Each fishing trip lasts about 40 days, punctuated by a few days of rest on the mainland, when many families and loved ones come together to celebrate these quieter moments. But this routine is upset by a shocking event: on September 1, 2020, the crews of two fishing boats, carrying 18 people in total, are hijacked off the coast of Libya and held in the stronghold of

108 days of imprisonment. "One Hundred and Eight" recounts the story as told by members of the crew of the Medinea, one of the two vessels seized, touching also upon the experiences of those onshore who waited and worked to make it possible for their loved ones to return. The documentary is the story of Marco, Piero, M'hammad, Onofrio, Rosetta, Rosaria, Naoires and Monica-and the story of a community that resists.







Alongside the banks of a river in Italy's Gorizia spreads a spontaneous encampment of migrants, the Jungle, a place suspended between cultures. Through the eyes of Elisa Menon, a charismatic social theater director, we will enter into this community and discover it through a very intimate and evocative theater performance that draws attention to the current migration in an unusual and empathic way. This unique film focuses on creating bonds between people and not thinking only about the differences.

And as Luca Marinelli and Giuseppe Battiston appeared in "Trust," a series revolving around the abduction of Getty for director Danny Boyle, Sara Serraiocco and Stefania Spampinato triumphed over dozens of competitors to respectively work in "Counterpart" and "Grey's Anatomy."

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Introducing FABRIZIO

The Roman songwriter makes his directorial debut in a film co-directed by Alessio De Leonardis "Ice" about a young boxer who is forced to fight the most important match

H is passion for cinema is almost a profound as that for music – he inherited this love from his mother, who took him to attend classes at the Roberto Rossellini Institute for Cinema and Television since he was a child. But it is in the realm of music that Fabrizio Moro has developed his artistic strengths. Moro is able to beautifully express the atmospheres of his suburban life and the places where he grew up through his musical compositions. These settings and memories serve as an inspiration for his songs that vividly accompany characters and places of an urban underworld. His songs, some of which are based on real life stories, can be compared to movie plots, as they resemble the ability of photographs and film sequences to capture the daily uneasiness of his contemporaries. In music, he has found a way to narrate life itself. Fabrizio Moro first won recognition and appreciation from audiences and critics at the renowned Sanremo Festival, initially winning in the Young Artists category and later in the main competition when he sang in a duet with Ermal Meta. One of the most established authors and songwriters of his generation, Moro has also tried his hand in television, working as a narrator on the show "Sbarre," the first

docu-reality shot inside the Rebibbia prison. Each episode tells the story of a young man who crosses paths with an inmate in dramatic and heartfelt confrontations. The story of this young man in a new world provides rich food for thought. After many years spent touring, recording and collaborating with high-profile recording artists such as Noemi and Gaetano Curreri from the band Stadio, Moro approached cinema in a very natural way. "Ice," produced by Francesca Verdini's La Casa Rossa and Tenderstories in association with the Università Telematica San Raffaele Roma, explores the redemption of a young boxer who falls victim to a criminal gang. The story of the boxer, who travels an inevitable path toward a life of crime, is also a story of two youngsters born in a district of Rome that seems deprived of the city's proverbial beauty, who must fight to pursue their dreams. In the context of the film, an opponent's punch represents the hardships of life, but one must be able to stand up again and fight back.

Fabrizio Moro has certainly stood up to this directorial challenge and created a powerful and touching film; one that establishes him as an interesting up and coming filmmaker on the Italian scene.

ICE, PUNCHING ONE'S FATE Giorgio, a promising young boxer, lives with his mother in a run-down, marginalized area of Rome. He has inherited a debt to the mob from his father, who was

assassinated years before, which condemns him to serving his father's murderers. With the help of Massimo, a former boxer who sees potential in the young man to succeed where he has failed, Giorgio dreams of a path towards redemption through his boxing career. However, the world of crime does not easily let go of those who



And more: Andrea Bocelli, Peppino Di Capri, Tiziano Ferro, Vittorio Grigolo, Dario Marianelli - renowned performers who each time turn their show into a real artistic happening.

DIANE RUNS UP HER HISTORIC TALLY

"Somehow You Do"

is her 13th nomination in the category "Best Original Song"

With a record-breaking number of nominations for a female singer, US composer Diane Warren, a long-time friend of the Los Angeles, Italia festival, has garnered a 13th Oscar nomination for her original song "Somehow You Do," included in the score of the Vertical Entertainment film "Four Good Days." The prestigious statuette has often crossed paths with the career of the amazing Warren, including last year with "Seen" (the English version of Laura Pausini's "Io Sì"). Diane Warren is considered to be among the most prolific and successful contemporary songwriters of our time. A quick glance at her list of Top Ten hits reveals a range of musical genres and styles so diverse it's difficult to believe the songs could have come from the same person.

Songwriter, musician and record producer, Warren rose to prominence in 1983, and has since written for and co-written songs with multiple singers, as well as for several feature films. She has written nine number one songs and 32 Top 10 songs on the Billboard Hot 100 chart. Additionally, two of the top 13 hits in the Hot 100's 57-year history were composed by her. Warren has won a Grammy, an Emmy, two Golden Globes, three consecutive Billboard Music Awards for Songwriter of the Year, and has been nominated for thirteen Academy Awards.

Diane Warren has written songs for such legends as Elton John, Tina Turner, Barbra Streisand, Aretha Franklin, Roberta Flack and Roy Orbison. Artists such as Lady Gaga, Cher, Patti LaBelle, 'N Sync, Gloria Estefan, Britney Spears, Christina Aguilera, Reba McEntire, Beyonce, Whitney Houston, Enrique Iglesias, Aerosmith, Ricky Martin, Faith Hill, Celine Dion, Mary J. Blige and LeAnn Rimes have also graced the charts with her songs.

Warren's massive success as a songwriter has offered her the opportunity to support a number of charitable causes. She is a Buddy for Life at AIDS Project Los Angeles and an honorary committee member of PETA. She has been a key donor to the Simon Wiesenthal Center Museum of Tolerance and founded the David S. Warren Weekly Entertainment Series at the Jewish Home for the Aging, a program she established in memory of her father.

Beyond his chameleon-like talent ranges from rap to theater to cinema, he also possesses the essential passion and enthusiasm of all big entertainers

Despite his diminutive stage name, Clementino, whose real name is Clemente Maccaro, can hold his own against the biggest US rappers. His sense of rhythm and jaw-dropping freestyle ability leaves no need to envy his revered overseas colleagues.

Clementino is among the most original Italian rappers. An inspired and authentic teller of gritty stories, he eschews an overly bombastic style while striking a balance between rap and pop. He embraces collaboration between genres, as he made clear when he appeared on the Sanremo stage, the Italian annual ultimate music festival. In 2006, Clementino published his first record, "Napolimanicomio,"

on which he rapped in both Italian and in the Neapolitan dialect.

The album featured collaborations with internationally recognized artists such as OneMic, Kiave, Francesco Paura, Spregiudicati, among others. Clementino has toured all of Italy, putting on hundreds of concerts during which he honed his formidable freestyling talent and demonstrated a natural stage presence generated by his love for theater and live entertainment. "Without my theater experiences, I would have never been able to become a rapper," Clementino often says in his interviews.

During his prolific career, Clementino has published records including "Mea Culpa," "Miracolo," and "Tarantelle;" launched summer hits like "Cos' cose"; and collaborated with such artists as Fabri Fibra, Gemitaiz, Gue Pequeno, Marracash, and MadMan.

Gifted with extraordinary communication skills and boundless artistic curiosity, Clementino has also found success in both television and cinema, proving extremely versatile and becoming one of the most appreciated Italian showmen.

Up there with his artistic passions is his love for his hometown soccer team. Clementino is such a big fan of S.S.C. Napoli that he is seriously considering a career as a sports commentator after his career in rap comes to an end.

A JUDGE FOR THE VOICE SENIOR

One of Clementino's most beloved performances is on "The Voice Senior," a singing competition open only to those over the age of 60 with a passion for music. Clementino has been a judge on the show since 2020, and has charmed audiences and contestants, alike, with his cheerfulness,

energy and quick comebacks. He is a born comedian who is a natural fit on stage with such celebrities as Loredana Bertè, Gigi D'Alessio, and Orietta Berti.
